The local, regional and national government has been slow to develop an interactive plan for the prevention of injuries in South Africa. Among the momentous changes at Childsafe South Africa during 2017 are:

We are currently working on finalising the various proposals.

2) Appointment of a Consultant Executive Director. The Childsafe National Board has long recognised the necessity of appointing a National Director to extend our activities nationwide. During 2016, we conducted an advertising campaign, identified and selected the person to take Childsafe to new heights. We are happy to announce that she joined the Childsafe team in July 2017.

3) Celebration of the Discovery Foundation Excellence Award for 2016. This is one of the greatest honours Childsafe has received during its decade-long tenure. This award truly pays great homage to all of its current staff and Board Members for their ongoing efforts to create a safer South Africa.

The various programmes have been successful only due to continued support from the Red Cross Children's Hospital Administration, the Provincial Government of the Western Cape and generosity of our large corporate donors, local and international.

Without their ongoing support, Childsafe South Africa would not have been able to perform its important task and South Africa be a much more dangerous place for its children.

Vision A safer world for children

Mission

Our mission is to promote optimal health and development of all children in South Africa. Childsafe aims to reduce and prevent intentional and unintentional injuries through research, education, environmental change and recommendations for legislation.

To achieve this, we work in co-operation with government, industry, non-governmental and community based organisations, community groups and individuals.

Childsafe believes that every child has a right to grow and flourish in a safe environment without the threat of being hurt.



Objectives

The specific objectives of Childsafe are:

• The promotion of a general understanding of the nature, extent and cost of childhood injuries.

- To raise community awareness of childhood safety and injury prevention.
- To reduce frequency, minimise the severity, or prevent the occurrence of childhood injuries.
- To serve as a recourse centre to the communities, providing meaningful information and resources regarding childhood injuries and their prevention.
- To serve as a scientific body of knowledge regarding childhood injuries and preventative methods.
- To foster community involvement as a basis for child accident and injury prevention services.
- To increase the level of participation of all sectors of the community (government and private organisations).
- To develop and implement injury prevention measures.
- To lobby and motivate for safety standards and legislation regarding children's products and safer environments.



Since 1991, Childsafe has continued to gather and update available statistics on childhood injuries and deaths presenting at the Red Cross War Memorial Children's Hospital Trauma Unit. Currently, this database has approximately over 160 000 childhood injuries.

The Childsafe database serves the purpose of a surveillance system on all childhood injuries. This database has been systematically analysed for a large number of clinical and epidemiological studies as they pertain to childhood injuries.

Many thanks go to our dedicated staff and volunteers who have kept the database up-to-date, thus, the most recent trauma data is available.

Childsafe received numerous requests for workshops, training courses and presentations. More than 7500 individuals were reached through our education and training sessions.

Home Safety Education/Referrals


Since the establishment of the Woolworths Childsafe Research and Educational Centre in 2014, Childsafe has been running educational and skills training programmes for child safety to parents and caregivers. Within the Childsafe centre, there is a demonstration and training room which offers the possibility to visualize unsafe and safe behaviour in all of the different rooms in the home. This demonstration and training room is especially designed to show parents potential threats inside the home as well as to offer simple examples of how child safety can be improved

The educational and skills training programme offered by Childsafe covers topics such as

- All types of burn injuries
- Transport related injuries
- Head injuries
- Falls
- Ingestions or poisonings

The target group consists of parents recruited at the Red Cross War Memorial Children's Hospital (RXH), whose children are already admitted due to unintentional injuries. The aim of the program is to empower these parents to prevent future accidents with any of their children.

Childsafe does counselling for individuals as well as groups, but the room is mainly visited by parents (mostly mothers) whose child is already been hospitalized because of an injury. The social work department and the other wards of the RXH refers parents to Childsafe, whenever they feel a parent would benefit from safety education.



We have recorded more than a thousand parents who have received the child safety education/ counselling since the opening of the Centre.

Child Carer Training Workshops

Approximately 80% of injuries to children presenting at the Red Cross War Memorial Children's Hospital Trauma Unit are sustained in and around the child's home, making the home very unsafe for the little ones. This is a matter of concern as most of these injuries can be prevented. Even minor accidents can be traumatic for children, caregivers and their families, causing immeasurable and avoidable misery and pain.

Nannies and day care workers are entrusted by parents with the safekeeping of their children while they are working. Therefore, this gives these workers a major responsibility, both to ensure that children are not exposed to danger while in their care, and also to act as role models for children in being safety conscious.

Childsafe offers a two-day group training to child carers (such as crèche staff, nannies). This training elaborates on all sorts of safety hazards in and around the home and includes a first-aid course.

As part of Child Safety month activities, Childsafe ran child carer training workshops in various provinces. We would like to thank the Woolworths team Katy Hayes and Milton Fredricks for organising these workshops. The training workshops took place at the following places and dates:





Durban (13th & 14th August)



Johannesburg (20th & 21st August)



Cape Town (10th September & 17th September)

During the different feedback session, all participants reported to have thoroughly enjoyed the training workshops and felt that they were very well organised.

School visits at Childsafe Centre

The Head of Clinical Unit, Department of Paediatric Surgery at Red Cross War Memorial Children's Hospital Dr Sharon Cox requested Childsafe to conduct a child safety presentation to learners of Springfield Primary School. On 26th and 27th October 2016 we held two child safety sessions with Grade 3 Springfield classes.

In March 2017 (29th & 31st), we had two other school groups visiting the Childsafe Centre. One group comprised learners of Cheam School from United Kingdom and the other group was a RB6 Soccer School team from Rondebosch.

All of the presentations focused on various issues which included: Burn prevention, Home and Road safety. These learners also had a practical session where they had to identify safe and unsafe practices in the Safety Demonstration Area.

Childsafe Projects Safer Candle Project

With the help of our generous sponsors and other kind support, Childsafe staff proudly celebrated the 10th Anniversary of the Safer Candle Project in August 2016 – the longest running Childsafe Project! To celebrate our 10th birthday and the distribution of 10,000 safer candles, we held a party with Burns Unit mothers, where a birthday cake, especially donated for the occasion, was shared.

Since inception in 2006, we have distributed 10,465 prepared safer candle units, and an extra 6017 educational leaflets, to a wide area of the Western and Eastern Cape regions; and to other areas of South Africa and beyond to East African countries.

Our focus has been to demonstrate and teach families, health professionals and other colleagues, how candles can be used with greater safety, using a recycled jar, half candles and dry sand. No extra financial expense is placed on a family.

Childsafe staff and volunteers continue to demonstrate the Safer Candle to mothers and carers weekly in the Out Patient Department waiting areas at Red Cross War Memorial Children's Hospital (RXH). Prepared candle units are distributed freely after demonstrations. We also demonstrate weekly to Family Education groups of in-patient mothers. Mothers are always grateful for the Safer Candle jars.









Childsafe is very grateful for the continuous support of Woolworths Trust for funds to buy supplies of sand, plastic bags and candles. To Constantia Crafters Group for donations of recycled jars and candles, and to retired RXH Sister Jenny Knobel who for many years has washed thousands for recycled jars for the Project. Also to Interns, who after training are able to make stock and give demonstrations.

Safe Travel to School Programme

The Safe Travel to School Programme (STTS) launched in 2014 and has seen remarkable and unprecedented growth since then. The Programme is a collaboration between Discovery and Childsafe aiming to help make the daily journey to and from school a safer one for children, by focussing on the learner transport driver.

Every day, thousands of Cape Town children are driven to school and back along high risk routes, in non-roadworthy vehicles and by drivers who often drive recklessly. Through a series of interventions, the Programme aims to develop cohorts of safer, reliable, more road-safety aware drivers. These interventions include:

- Checking the roadworthiness of the learner transport vehicles;
- Monitoring driver behaviour through the patented Discovery Insure DQ tracking device;
- Providing feedback and awarding incentives so as to improve driving behaviour;
- Testing drivers' eye sight and providing glasses where necessary;
- Training the drivers in first aid and defensive driving.

Since its launch with a mere 17 scholar transport drivers, the Programme has exploded onto the scholar transport scene. There were 78 drivers on the programme in 2015, and by the end of 2016, 385 scholar transport drivers transporting scholars all over Cape Town – exceeding the target of 300 drivers set for 2016!

On 3rd of November 2016, Childsafe gathered more than 450 school transporters and road safety stakeholders at the Athlone Civic Centre to acknowledge the safest drivers. The top prize was a brand 16 seater minibus, Nissan Impendulo (worth R395 000). This car was won by Mr William Lottering, a school driver from Manenberg.

The STTS team continued to recruit scholar transport drivers driving children who are especially vulnerable. These learners attend the range of special needs schools in Cape Town. To date, the scholar transport drivers from eleven special needs schools have joined the Programme.

A safe driver is a healthy driver: a new collaboration established

The first aid training sessions include wellness indicator checks. We found that significant numbers of scholar drivers score badly on wellness indicators. Many had excessively high blood pressure readings, poor BMI readings, displayed pre-diabetic symptoms and some drivers smoked. Discussions have ensued with the Department of Health's Health Promotion Units and wellness information/training sessions are being planned. We continue to manage the relationships with the range of partners and service providers positively. Our relationship with Specsavers started last year, continues to improve.

Programme expansion

The team plans to travel to KwaZulu Natal province with the aim of preparing for the expansion of the STTS Programme to this region.

Walk This Way

Under FedEx's sponsorship, The Walk this Way project has been opportune to continue its implementation of multi-level pedestrian safety interventions in low-income elementary schools located along 'high-risk route' areas in South Africa. The past year saw the scale up from five to 10 schools across Cape Town and Johannesburg. The study continues with its aim to improve school learners' road safety knowledge and introduce environmental modifications with the support of local road safety partners.

Over 6 435 school learners (across the five schools) received a series of road safety education workshops with the support of Childsafe's collaborating partners, namely the City of Cape Town Road Safety Inspectors. All learners from the participating schools received reflective bag tags to promote their visibility on the road during low light conditions and its usability was monitored. One hundred and fifty school educators and 168 parents joined in the various activities. Simple key messages were promoted during their road safety education training that includes: where to cross the road; how to cross the road; and knowledge of basic road safety signage.

The five elementary schools that joined end-November 2016 underwent a pre-assessment of the learners' knowledge, attitude and behaviour towards road safety awareness start-March 2017. Trained data collectors were tasked to collect data by means of anonymous surveys. School educators were requested to partake in a self-administered anonymous survey on road safety.

Commitments for the current year include the continued implementation of road safety education measurements across the ten schools; and the targeted modifications of environmental modifications at selected schools.

Safe Schools

Following the successful completion of Phase 1 of the Safe Schools project, Childsafe worked with Isikhokelo Primary School (which was the control school) in Phase 2. This school has approximately 1188 learners, 90% of whom are pedestrians, mainly crossing the busy and hazardous Jeff Masemola Road. This road is high risk, with vehicles travelling at excessive speed and requires improved protection for the hundreds of children crossing at peak times to and from school.

In this Phase 2, the same interventions from Phase 1 were undertaken. These include:

Road Safety Training

Presentations were conducted by the Department of Transport: Road Safety Management to all Educators in all three phases (Senior, Intermediate and Foundation Phase). The Program is an integration of road safety into the school curriculum called Safety in Traffic Education Program (STEP). Each educator received educational material which consists of a teacher's book with 10 lessons per grade and road safety posters according to the level of understanding of learners in that Grade.

All topics were prepared by Road Safety Experts with the intention of learners learning necessary and relevant road safety rules and signs. In addition, it is meant to encourage positive behaviour on the road, the ability to recognise safe places to cross, knowing and understanding road signs at their age. The educators were equipped with road safety material so as to allow them not to struggle and hassle when implementing road safety according to the school terms and curriculum.

As an additional aspect, we asked the City of Cape Town Traffic Department to do training of learners from Grade 1-7 learners. This was done to enforce what the teachers had already taught in class. The foundation phase learners were all grouped together in a hall and a road safety presentation was done through the Mascot Danny Cat on Day 1. On Day 2, the traffic officer went class by class from Grade 4-7. These were 1hr sessions in each class.

On 24th of November 2016, all the learners in this school were provided with locally sourced reflective tracksuit jackets. The main purpose for this was so as to increase their visibility in traffic while walking on these dangerous roads. Childsafe would like to thank IVECO for the generous sponsorship and support for this initiative.

Conferences & Capacity Building Finland Conference

The 12th World Conference on Injury Prevention and Safety Promotion Conference was held from the 18th – 21st September 2016 at Tampere Hall in Tampere, Finland. While experts in injury prevention and safety promotion recognise the need for action, the state-of-theart knowledge and practice from these fields are not consistently applied to policies and programmes in the field; therefore, the main theme for the conference, was "From research to implementation". This theme sought to provoke new ideas and experiences to address this gap. Pumla Mtambeka and Prof van As were privileged to not only attend, but also presented

some of Childsafe's work.

Enabling Leadership Program

Pumla Mtambeka and Chiedza Mujeni attended a Capacity Building and Organisational Development (CBOD) programme offered by Discovery in Sandton. The programme aims to empower and equip representatives from various NGO's that Discovery funds with leadership skills which would enable them to strengthen the operational capacity of their organisation, despite the general decline in donor funding. This programme is also designed to expose Organisational Leaders to various leadership elements to enable growth and enhance the leadership impact that they have within their organisation.

The Programme curriculum entails three learnings which were presented in 3 block placements at Discovery's offices in Sandton Johannesburg:

1. **Personal Mastery** - a discipline of continually clarifying and deepening your personal vision, focusing your energies, developing emotional Intelligence(EQ) and seeing reality objectively in order to live life in the service of your highest aspirations.

2. Business Acumen - is keenness and quickness in understanding and dealing with a business situation in a manner that is likely to lead to a good outcome.

3. Networking - this module empowers leaders with the ability to grow in authority and confidence through understanding trends and using trends to build networks tangibly or through social networking platforms.

Global Alliance of NGOs for Road Safety Scholarship

In August, the Global Alliance of NGOs for Road Safety ran a state-of-the art training course at FedEx Headquarters in Memphis, Tennessee. Chiedza Mujeni was fortunate to get a scholarship to participate in this training course.

The two week tailored course (22nd August – 2nd September 2016) was a part of the Alliance Empowerment Program, a capacity building program that aimed to improve the ability of nongovernmental organisations working in road safety around the world. The Empowerment Program designs and implements initiatives that significantly reduce the risk of injuries and

fatalities on the world's roads, where 1.2 million people die in road traffic accidents each year. The Alliance Advocate trainings gave representatives from 15 countries the opportunity to grow their expertise as they advocate for safer roads.

Advocacy & Legislation

Passenger and Driver Awareness Event

Childsafe South Africa in partnership with The Department of Transport hosted a **Passenger** and Driver Awareness Event on the 16th of March 2017. The aim of this event was to create awareness about the importance of restraining children in motor vehicle. At the Red Cross War Memorial Children's Hospital alone, approximately 20 children per month are treated for injuries sustained in motor vehicle collisions. Eighty percent (80%) of these injured children were not buckled up or restrained in any way at all. Most of these injuries could have been prevented through appropriate restraining. Car safety seats (child restraints) reduce the risk of death in passenger cars by 71% for infants, and 54% for toddlers. Unrestrained children are more likely to be injured, suffer severe injuries and die in motor vehicle crashes than children who are restrained.

Through the generous donation of 21 car seats from the Road Traffic Management Corporation, these were distributed to recipients on the day.


